Adult-led · Ages approximately 4–12 · Participation is optional

Five ways to attend to Scripture

Use one practice at a time. The adult chooses the passage, names the choices, and keeps the response optional.

Prepare a short session

Preview the whole passage, check the translation, and decide whether today is a good time. Set aside a storm, grief, or difficult image when it is not suitable.

Name the choices before reading: listen, look, draw, stand, move, ask a question, or pass. Show a first-then sequence and identify the trusted adult who can help.

Keep the reading small. A paragraph and one observable question are enough. Ask what happens or which word stands out, never for a secret or a child's biggest fear.

End with a prayer, drawing, practical act of care, or quiet pause. A shorter session is a successful adaptation; no one needs to finish a page.

STEPS

Listen to the passage Joshua 1:8

Read a short passage aloud twice. Let a child follow a picture, hear a repeated word, or listen without replying.

Notice what happens Psalm 1:1-3

Ask what happens, who speaks, or which image stands out. Keep the question about the passage rather than private life.

Turn toward God Psalm 19:14

Offer a short prayer of thanks, lament, or help. Honest uncertainty belongs in prayer; no child needs a polished answer.

Imagine one safe detail Philippians 4:8

For a story, notice one ordinary detail such as a road, table, or welcoming gesture. This is an artistic aid, not a private message from God.

Carry one response Romans 12:2

Choose one observable next step: ask for help, tell the truth, include someone, or return to the passage later.

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Rooted attention

REFERENCE

Psalm 1:1-3

NOTICE

The poem pictures a person returning to God's teaching like a tree near water. The image describes a life shaped over time; it does not erase hard seasons.

PRAYER

God, help us receive what is true and grow with care. We can carry one word such as rooted, water, or another word we choose. Amen.

CARRY

Draw roots, colour a tree, or leave the page blank.

PROMPT

Younger: What does the tree receive? Older: What helps a person grow?

A word to remember

REFERENCE

Joshua 1:8

NOTICE

Joshua is told to keep God's instruction near, speak about it, and practise it. The passage calls for faithful attention, not a formula for success.

PRAYER

God, help us listen well and take one wise step. We can ask a trusted adult when a step is confusing. Amen.

CARRY

Choose one kind, honest, or helpful action without reporting completion.

PROMPT

Younger: An adult models one action. Older: Make a read, notice, do card.

Notice what is true and good

REFERENCE

Philippians 4:8

NOTICE

Paul names qualities worth attending to, including what is true, fair, lovely, and worthy of praise. The list gives attention a direction without denying pain.

PRAYER

God, help us notice goodness without pretending difficult things are easy. Show us one way to practise love today. Amen.

CARRY

Draw two columns labelled true and kind, or let an adult scribe one example.

PROMPT

Younger: Choose between two pictures. Older: Discuss how truth guides speech.

Presence in a valley

REFERENCE

Psalm 23:1-4

NOTICE

The shepherd poem includes provision, guidance, and a dark valley. Its comfort is God's presence, not a claim that danger or grief never occurs.

PRAYER

God, be near as we seek wise help and care for one another. Amen.

CARRY

Fill a water bottle, check on a neighbour through an adult, or ask for help.

PROMPT

Younger: Retell one image. Older: Notice the poem's movement and direct address.

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Jesus welcomes the weary

REFERENCE

Matthew 11:28-30

NOTICE

Jesus invites burdened people to come and learn his gentle way. The invitation does not say every problem disappears or that a child must feel calm.

PRAYER

Jesus, thank you for meeting people with gentleness. Help us receive help and offer gentleness to others. Amen.

CARRY

Put one support, such as a break or trusted adult, on a help-is-allowed card.

PROMPT

Younger: Choose a helper picture. Older: Discuss learning from Jesus as relationship.

Hear and do

REFERENCE

James 1:19-25

NOTICE

James connects listening, careful speech, and action. Hearing Scripture shapes a life; it is not a performance or a reason to shame someone who needs more time.

PRAYER

God, help us listen before we answer and practise one small act of love. If we make a mistake, help us tell the truth and repair it. Amen.

CARRY

Use a fictional scenario to choose a listening response.

PROMPT

Younger: Use listen and act picture cards. Older: Role-play a neutral turn-taking moment.

Welcomed by Jesus

REFERENCE

Mark 10:13-16

NOTICE

Adults bring children to Jesus, the disciples try to send them away, and Jesus welcomes them. Children are received with dignity, not treated as projects.

PRAYER

Jesus, thank you for welcoming children. Help our family welcome one another and make room for people who need care. Amen.

CARRY

Make room, share materials, or offer a kind greeting without public testimony.

PROMPT

Younger: Use a welcome gesture. Older: Discuss what the scene asks of adults.

Use the seven-day plan

The starter plan moves from rooted attention to truthful response: delight, God's word, what is good, presence in a valley, Jesus' invitation, hearing and doing, and Jesus welcoming children.

Every day includes a reference, original paraphrase, adult script, optional response, age cue, and stop route. The full seven days are below, so the page remains useful when the PDF is not opened.

WORKED EXAMPLE

Psalm 1:1-3

I notice the tree near water. I can return to Scripture and ask for help when I need it.

AGE ROUTES

AGE ROUTE

Approximately ages 4-7: Retell one scene in two sentences, offer one question, and let the child point, colour, move, listen, or pass.

AGE ROUTE

Approximately ages 8-11: Read a paragraph twice, name one action or image, and choose drawing, speaking, movement, or listening.

AGE ROUTE

Approximately ages 12+: Read the surrounding section, add context, and allow a private question or journal note without requiring disclosure.

STOP

You do not have to keep going. We can stop, keep our eyes open, move, draw, get water, or sit with a trusted grown-up.

ADAPT

You may listen, choose another activity, or pass. Eyes may stay open, and movement or drawing is welcome.

GET HELP

If distress persists, worsens, or affects school, sleep, play, or relationships, contact a qualified professional; use local safeguarding or emergency services for immediate danger.
